ST. CATHARINES PUBLIC LIBRARY 1888 - 2012

Executive Summary

The St. Catharines Public Library has served the community since 1888. While much has changed over the past century the fundamental principles of library service have remained the same. The Library continues to support and promote literacy, life-long learning and self-improvement. The Library provides access to cultural resources, leisure materials and a world of information in a wide variety of formats. The library offers programs for all age groups including computer and cultural programs. It's doors are open to everyone regardless of age, ability, education, or economic status. The Library provides accessible public space where individuals and groups can meet to learn, discuss and share ideas.

The St. Catharines Public Library's website provides a portal to the Library's resources. The website provides 24/7 access to: over 77,832 electronic full-text magazines, newspapers, and reference sources; 200 reference E-books; and a large downloadable collection which includes books and music. Patrons can search for materials, place holds, print full-text articles and download materials from at the library or from their home or office using a smart phone, notebook or tablet pc. The library promotes its services in a variety of ways including using social media tools such as Facebook and Twitter.

Key objectives for 2012 included the following:

- Opening the new Grantham Branch at 425 Carlton Street.
- Installing a VoIP (Voice over IP) telephone system.
- Installing a Web Service mobile application that gives clients with iPhones, Androids and iPod devices access to the catalogue, renewals and holds.
- Upgrading 108 pc computers to MS Office 2010.
- Replacing 24 outdated computers.
- Conducting an inventory of the entire collection.
- Introducing a downloadable music collection.
- Launching the "Brock Talks Speaker's Series."
- Developing the "Explore the War of 1812" program series.
- Hosting the "Niagara Frontier War of 1812 Exhibit of Art Studies and Stories" exhibition.
- Conducting the 12th Annual Teen Writing Contest.
- Expanding the downloadable audio and e-book collection.
- Completing the replacement of all 1st floor windows at the Centennial Library.
- Building a storage facility in the Underground Garage at the Centennial Library.
- Engaging a consultant to prepare design and tender documents for Facility Accessibility Design Standards improvements at the Centennial Library.
- Preparing the Strategic Agenda: Information, Innovation, Integration 2013-2015.

The report that follows provides more detail on the activities of the Library in 2012.

2012 REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND ANNUAL STATISTICS

Technology

Libraries have always used technology to improve access to their collections and services. Libraries have online catalogues, automated acquisitions and electronic ordering systems, online full-text databases, downloadable collections, real-time online reference services, Web based services, etc. The Library's technological infrastructure is always evolving to improve the delivery services to the client.

The Library builds upon prior IT objectives some of which are listed below.

- 2006, replaced the integrated automated system.
- 2008, installed software that allowed clients to search the online catalogue, electronic fulltext databases, e-books and web resources all at the same time. Installed software that allowed patrons to self-manage access to the public Internet stations.
- 2009, implemented WebServices including a Wordpress Blog, Help Desk Ticketing and Support Tracking system, an internal staff WebBlog, and a document management and distribution system. Installed Wifi at the Central Library.
- 2010, implemented an automated credit bureau collection process. Launched the downloadable audio and e-book collection. Installed Wifi at the Branches.
- 2011, installed a new Unified Threat Management Firewall. Installed social media software (Facebook and Twitter) to improve our communication and promotion strategies. Launched InfoChat a real-time reference service.
- 2012, installed a VoIP (Voice over IP) telephone system. Installed software applications
 that allow clients access to the Library from iPhones and Androids. Launched a
 downloadable music collection. Installed MS Office 2010 on 108 pc's. Upgraded 25
 computers.

The Library has 140 computer workstations across the system, as well as public and staff printers. A cascading replacement strategy has allowed the Library to replace outdated computers annually thereby maintaining the workstation infrastructure.

Virtual Library Branch

The "Virtual Library Branch" is an extremely important component of library services. The Library's website is the access point to the collections including: over 77,832 electronic full-text magazines, newspapers and reference sources; 200 reference e-books; and a downloadable collection that includes books and music. The public can search for materials, place holds, renew items, download books, and print full text articles from their home or office using a smart phone, notebook or tablet pc. Clients have access to a real-time online reference service "Info Chat" as well as an email reference service.

Facebook and Twitter

In June 2011 the Library set up both Facebook and Twitter accounts. The accounts are severed so that the information posted on Twitter is not automatically posted to Facebook. Social media is being used to keep patrons informed about our collections, services/programs and to elicit user feedback. At the end of December 2012 there were 966 followers on Twitter and 605 followers on Facebook.

Collections

Collection development plans ensure the systematic review of all resources. The collections include a variety of formats – print, DVDs, CDs, microfilm, microfiche and digital media.

As of December 20th, 2012 the Library had added 24,378 titles (23,183 print/AV titles and 1,195 digital titles) and 47,986 copies (46,768 print/AV copies and 1,218 digital copies). The online electronic full-text magazine, newspaper and reference materials are not included in these collection statistics. The Library's holdings at year end were 257,861 Titles and 365,936 copies.

Full Text Downloadable Magazines, Newspapers and Reference Materials

In 2004 the Library acquired electronic databases which provided access to 2,500 full-text electronic magazines, newspapers and reference books. By 2012 the Library was providing access to 77,832 online magazines, newspapers, and reference materials.

Full-text Electronic periodical/newspaper databases provide many benefits to the user and library system. They increase the Library's periodical collection in a cost effective manner. They can be searched simultaneously by many users. They can be accessed 24/7. Issues are never missing, signed out or defaced. Staff involvement with respect to maintenance is minimal.

Downloadable Audio and e-Book Collection

The Library launched the downloadable audio and e-book collection in June 2010. At the end of December 2012 there were 3,909 copies in the collection which had circulated 24,852 times. The collection has materials for all age groups and includes fiction and non-fiction titles.

Downloadable Music Collection

In 2012 the Library launched a downloadable music collection. The decision was based on a service review. Access to a downloadable collection has many advantages for patrons and the Library. Patrons have access to tens of thousands of artists, hundreds of music labels and over 160 musical genres. The collection can be accessed remotely. Patrons can select the exact pieces of music they want to hear. To ensure equity of access downloads per patron, per week are pre-set by the Library. Unlike physical music collections, downloadable collections do not require processing, cataloguing, shelf space nor do they become damaged, misplaced or lost.

Special Collections/Local History

This unique collection consists of local history and genealogical materials in a wide variety of formats. The Library purchases materials for this collection, primarily microfilm resources of newspapers, census tracks etc.

Special Collections - Ancestry Database

One of the electronic databases the Library has access to is the Ancestry database — an online genealogical reference tool which includes Census Records, Wills, Passenger Lists, Birth/Death/Marriage records and many other unique full-text primary sources. Access to this database is currently funded by the Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Sport. Staff offer several courses in the Computer Lab on genealogical research and a specific class on how to search the Ancestry database.

Programs for Children

A primary role of the Library is the development of literacy skills in children 0-11 years of age. To support this objective the Library offers the sessional and drop-in programs listed below.

- Books for Babies (age 0-24 months)
- Toddler Time (age 24-40 months)
- Preschool Storytime (age 3-5 yrs)
- Family Storytime (drop-in for ages 5 and under and their families)
- Saturday Story Stairs (drop-in all ages)

In 2012 the Library conducted 115 programs/activities for teens and 1,763 participated.

Fresh Ink Contest

This was the 12thyear for the 'Fresh Ink Poetry and Short story Writing Contest.' It is open to teens across the Region who are 12 to 18 years of age. In 2012 there were 43 short story and 42 poetry entries. There are two (2) age categories for the submissions, 12-15 and 16-18 years of age. A winner and runner-up is chosen for short stories and poetry in each of the age categories. One-hundred and forty (140) people attended the awards ceremony. TD Canada Trust is the corporate sponsor.

Staff developed the "Explore the War of 1812 @ the Library" series and will continue this programming in 2013. This was the 8th year that the Library has organized the "Niagara Reads" program which profiles local authors. "Niagara Reads" is held in October during Public Library Month. In 2012 the Library offered 246 life-long learning programs and author readings, which were attended by 4,143 patrons.

In 2012 the Library had offered a total of 124 programs/activities. Total attendance was 17,319.

"Niagara Frontier War of 1812 Exhibit of Art Studies and Stories" exhibition

On October 16th The Hon. David C. Onley, Lieutenant Governor General of Ontario unveiled the "Niagara Frontier War of 1812 Exhibit of Art Studies and Stories" at the Centennial Library. The exhibit consisted of over 40 original art studies. Guest speakers included the Governor General and Stephen Sheaffe and descendant of Sir Roger Hale Sheaffe who became at the Battle of Queenston Heights when General Brock fell.

Facilities

In 2012 the Library replaced all the Windows on the 1st floor of the Central Library. A storage facility was built in the underground parking lot. Aconsultant was engaged to prepare design and tender documents for the identified Facility Accessibility Design Standards improvements at the Centennial Library. The improvements are to commence in 2013.

Outreach, Visiting Library Service

Up to the end of November the Library had made 624 housebound visits delivering 4,307 items. Throughout the year, staff provided outreach to daycares and schools, as well as book deposits to a number of seniors' residences.

Fundraising and Grants

Grants -\$13,472.80

In 2012 the Library received \$13,134 from the Community Access Program to purchase multifunction printer/scanner/copiers for all locations, a Computer Training Room laptop and LCD projector, and a network switch.

Fundraising and Donations -\$39,501

The Library continued fundraising activities. Fundraising initiatives include a variety of donation programs, as well as the sale of used books and equipment. In 2012 these avenues realized a contribution of \$39,501.

Meeting Rooms

Meeting rooms are provided primarily for not-for-profit community groups. In 2012 the rooms generated \$16,742.50 in revenue.

Aquatic Centre and New Library Branch Update

In 2012 Library staff continued to work on projects related to the completion of the new library branch. Members of the Library's Project Team liaised with the City's Project Manager on a regular basis to respond to questions from the general contractor with respect to various elements of the Library.

July 3, 2012

After years of planning and construction work, the Kiwanis Aquatic Centre and Library opened on July 3, 2012. The old Grantham Branch which had served the community since 1961 was closed and the new branch opened to serve the public in its new location!
