## CEO Report

### For Information

#### **Central Library Renovation Update**

SCPL has worked with the City to submit two Green and Inclusive Community Buildings (GICB) grant applications in 2023 and 2024 respectively. The first application was turned down and the second application is still pending. SCPL also submitted a grant application to RBC Foundation last December and the application was also rejected recently.

SCPL is now pivoting to a reduced-scope project to ensure viability. The Architect provided a fee proposal to complete revised schematic design documents, including the preparation of a class D estimate for the revised scope of work, on February 23, 2026.

The CEO, the Business Administrator and the Board Chair met with the Mayor and City CAO on March 2, 2026 to discuss the options to move the renovation project forward. We are meeting with city staff in April 2026 to discuss 2027 capital budget and planning to present to Council in June 2026 to request release of the city funds. Our hope is to kick off the renovation project in 2027 with a reduced scope.

#### **Incident Report Update**

Staff shared the recent Incident Report (presented to the Board at its February meeting) with the Mayor, City CAO and Manager of Homelessness Service at the Region.

The City is working with Niagara Regional Police to have direct access to the Library's cameras.

In partnership with the Region, the Niagara Assertive Street Outreach (NASO) team will provide a training to library staff.

#### **Community Needs Assessment Update**

Contract was awarded to Nordicity on Tuesday, February 24, 2026. Staff had a kick-off meeting with them on March 4, 2026 to discuss objectives, expectations, work plan and timeline.

Staff is currently gathering background documents, including current Strategic Plan, library holdings, usage, and circulation/programming data, past survey results and reports, and demographic information.

We anticipate that interviews, surveys, and community engagement events will take place from late April to late May, the draft report is expected in August, and Nordicity will present their report to the Board at its September meeting.

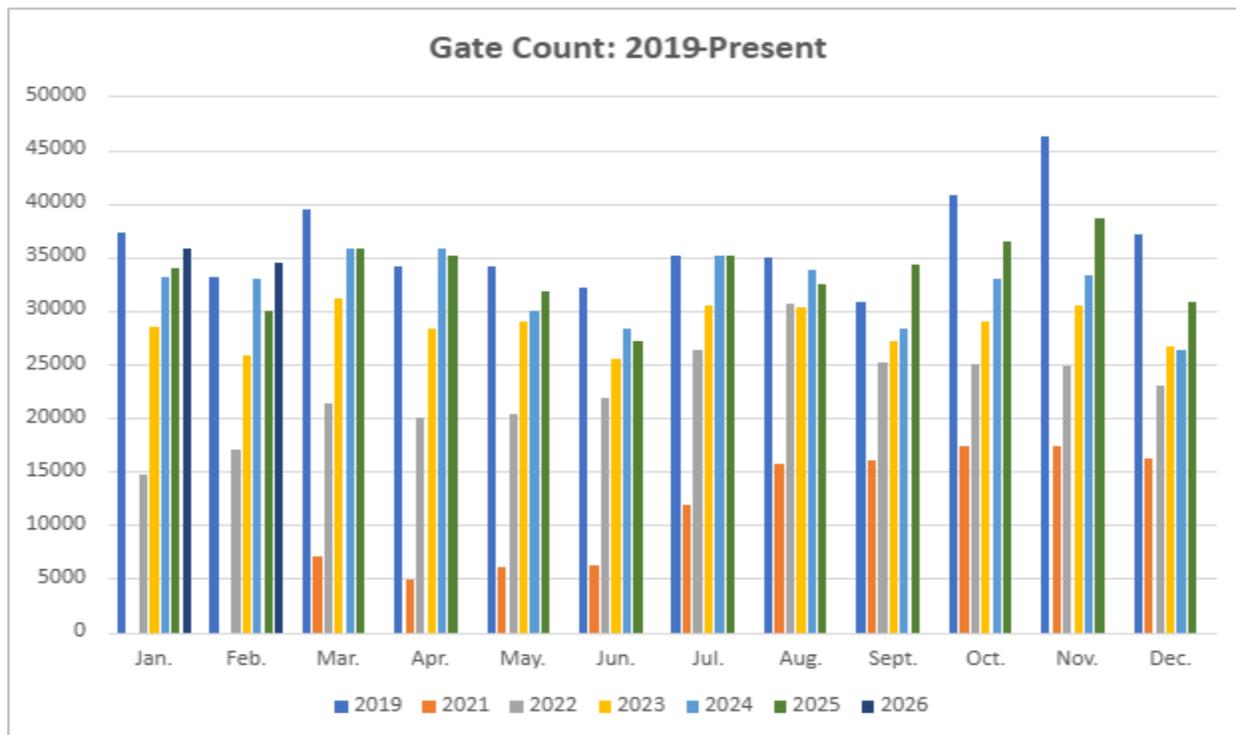

#### Gate Count

In February, our system-wide gate count increased by 14% compared to February 2025. Overall, our system-wide gate count continues its steady climb toward pre-pandemic 2020 levels.



## **Membership**

New memberships are steadily rising, with a 6% increase over February 2025, reflecting strong community interest in library services. Class visits and school outreach are underway, and the library continues to promote the online membership application to encourage new registrations.

## **Holds Placed**

The number of holds placed increased by 3% over February 2025. This service continues to play an important role in ensuring equitable and convenient access to library materials for customers throughout the city.

## **Training Highlights**

In January, library staff had an opportunity to attend Niagara Peninsula Aboriginal Area Management Board's (NPAAMB) The River training. The workshop is designed to bridge the divide between Indigenous and non-Indigenous community members and help staff learn more about the urban Indigenous community and how to best support them.

In February, staff were introduced to a peer-to-peer debriefing process designed to provide structured support after a distressing incident. Debriefing can provide a timely and flexible intervention that helps employees walk each other through the immediate impact of any incident. This process is not meant to replace ongoing supports such as EAPs or training, but to provide immediate support after difficult situations if staff choose to participate. A training session was held for staff who expressed interest in being a peer debriefer and the initiative has now commenced.

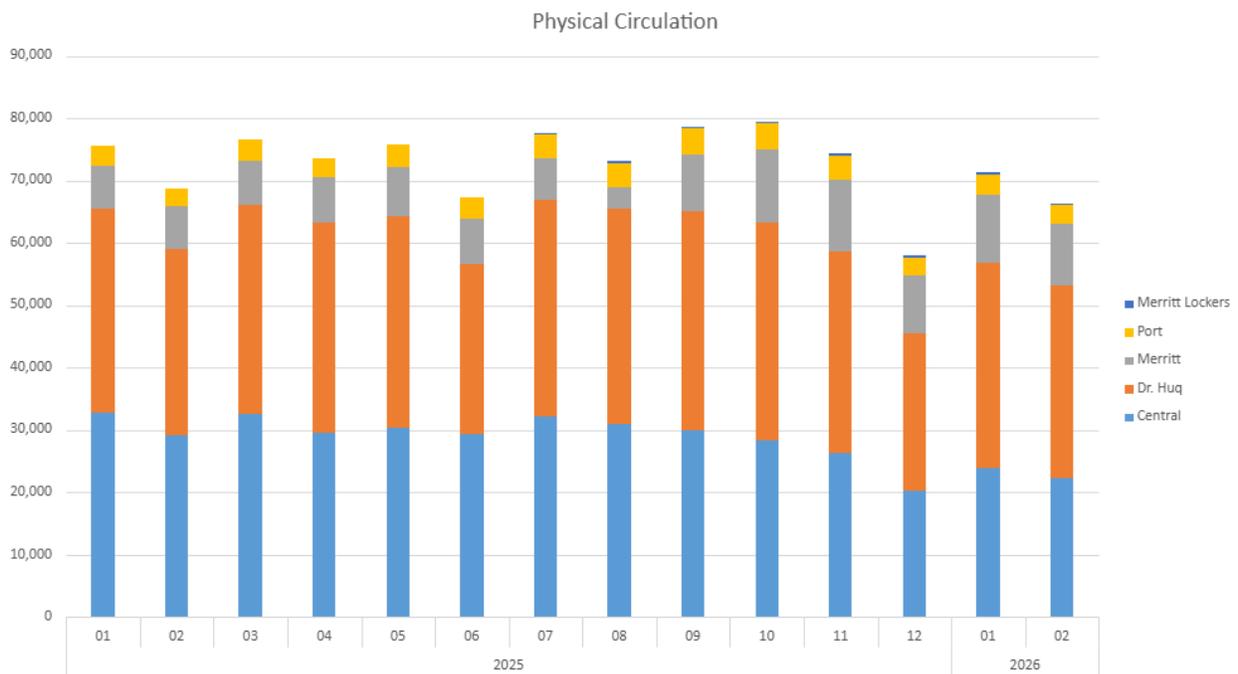

#### Physical Circulation

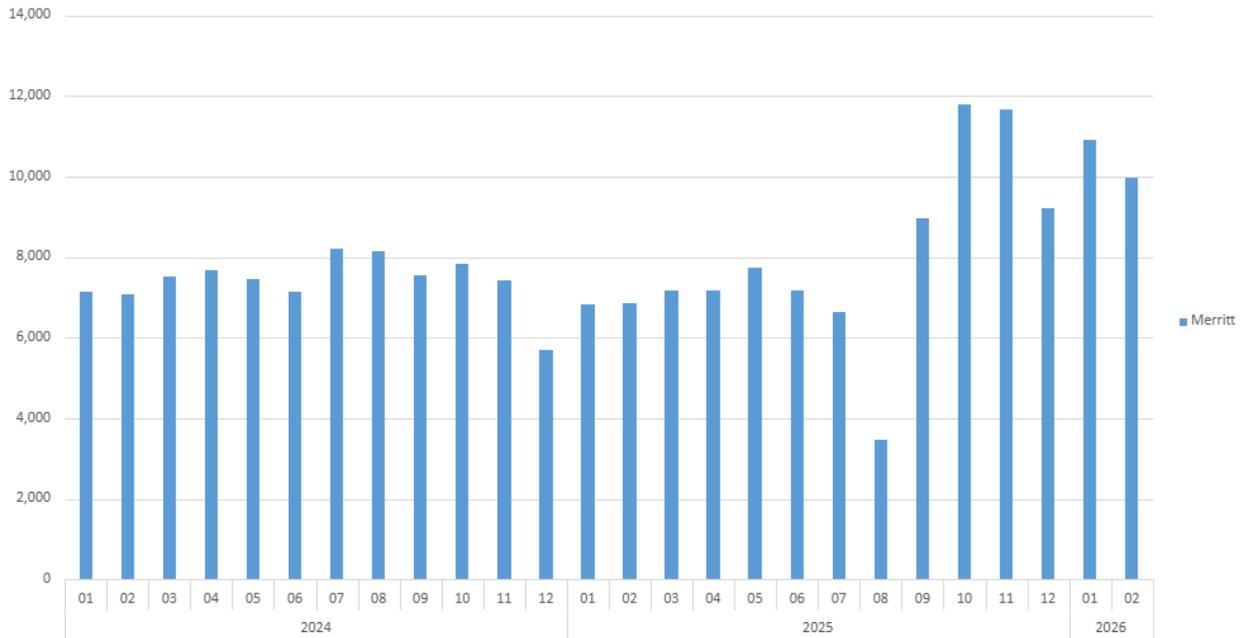
Physical circulation declined by 7% from January to February 2026. This appears to be a common trend throughout previous years.



#### Merritt Physical Circulation

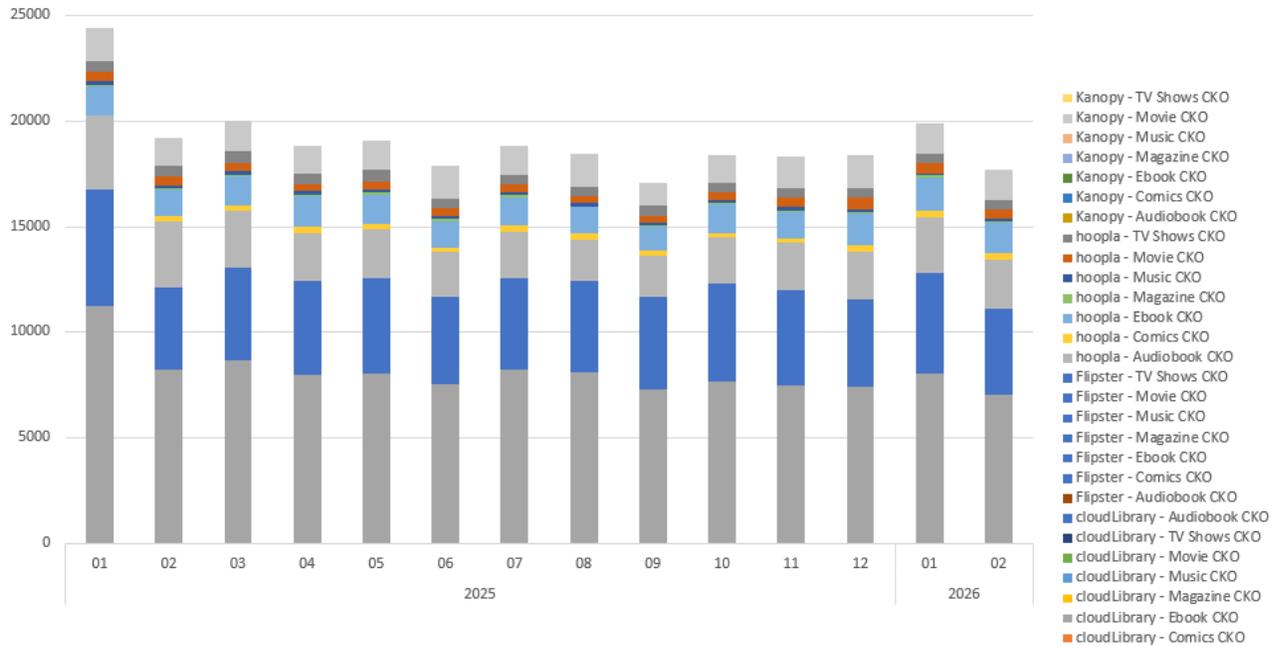
Since re-opening in late August 2025, physical circulation at Merritt has increased by 48.2% over the same period (September 2025 - February 2026 vs. September 2024 - February 2025.)

### Digital Circulation

Digital circulation of online resources decreased by 7% from January to February 2026. Like physical circulation, this appears to be a February trend, with previous years showing similar declines.



## **Library of Things**

Four new items were added to the Library of Things collection:

- Nex Playground – An active, motion-based home video game console designed to encourage physical activity and interactive play for families.
- Thermal Camera – A device that detects heat and produces a visual image of temperature differences, helping users identify cold spots that may require additional insulation in their homes.
- Drawing Tablet – A versatile digital tool suitable for drawing, photo editing, visual communications, notetaking and other creative tasks.
- C-Pen - A portable, text-to-speech scanning device that reads printed text out loud as it is moved across the page, supporting accessibility and reading assistance.

In addition, demand for Radon Gas Detectors remains high. More than 125 holds were placed on existing units, prompting the purchase of additional detectors to help meet community demand.

## **Gamerspace**

Two Nintendo Switch 2 Consoles were purchased for the Gamerspace. All previous games from the original Switch consoles were transferred to the new Nintendo Switch 2 consoles and will allow SCPL to expand the collection to include Nintendo Switch 2 games as well.

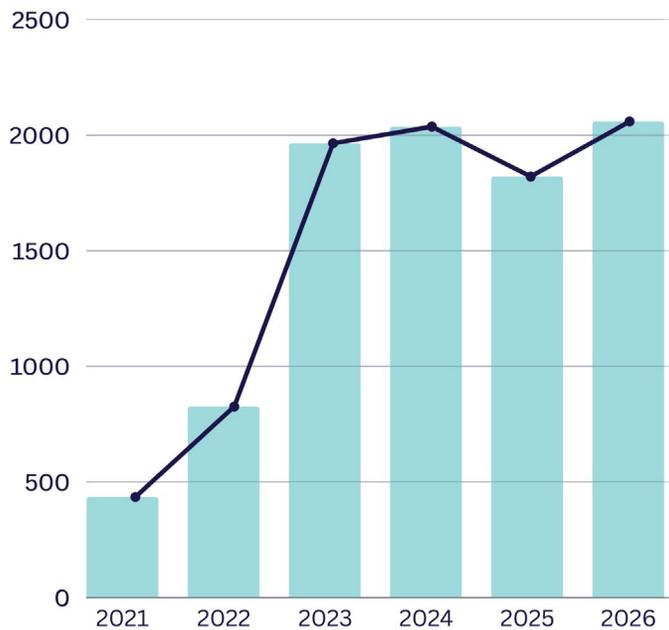

#### Programming Highlights

SCPL's winter programming for the month of February included our usual line-up of core programming for children, teens, and adults, as well as a variety of seasonal events and drop-in programs for all ages. In total, 2,059 customers attended or engaged in programs and outreach events in February, marking a 13% increase from the same period last year.

Of special programming note in February:

#### **STC 150 Celebrations**

SCPL continues to contribute to the City's 150th-anniversary celebrations with programs focusing on local heritage and community identity. "Harriet Tubman in Niagara," with guest speaker Rochelle Bush, explored the city's connection to Harriet Tubman and the

Underground Railroad (32 attendees). "Public Archaeology & Cataract House Hotel," in partnership with the Niagara Peninsula Society of the Archaeological Institute of America, featured a talk by Douglas Perelli, Director of Archaeology Survey, University of Buffalo. The talk focused on the history of the Cataract House hotel (37 participants). "Unerasing Ourselves" was a special lecture presented by Brock University's Dr. Gregory Betts, looking at the history of St. Catharines and its links to such authors as Frederick Douglas, John Richardson, Thomas D'Arcy McGee, and Harriet Tubman (15 attendees).

As part of the ongoing sesquicentennial celebrations, SCPL is collaborating with the City of St. Catharines and the St. Catharines Museum on an exciting new Spring 2026 event, "One Read, One STC". This "one book, one city" program is designed to foster community connection, literacy, and dialogue by encouraging all residents to read and discuss a single book simultaneously. Best-selling Canadian author Terry Fallis' new book *The Marionette* has been selected as our title. The initiative will culminate in an author event, featuring a conversation between Mayor Siscoe and Terry Fallis. The event, scheduled for June 11, 2026 at the St. Catharines Museum's Lockview Lounge, will provide an opportunity for residents to come together in celebration of the City's 150th anniversary, celebrating a love of reading and nurturing community-wide conversation and sharing of ideas.

### **Port Winterfest**

SCPL continues to support the work of the Port200 Committee, a dedicated group of community volunteers coordinating events to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Port Dalhousie. A key highlight this month was the Port Dalhousie Winterfest, which featured winter games and activities for all ages. SCPL participated by offering family-friendly crafts and activities, membership registration, and access to borrowable items, demonstrating the library's role in celebrating local heritage and our ongoing commitment to community-building.

### **Seollal Showcase**

SCPL partnered with the Korean Cultural Centre in Niagara to host the all-ages "Seollal Showcase", a Korean Lunar New Year event, a traditional holiday that celebrates family, cultural heritage, and the welcoming of a new year. Participants experienced Korean culture through hands-on activities such as wearing Hanbok, traditional games and paper folding, and popular culture experiences inspired by Squid Game and K-Pop Demon Hunters (115 attendees).

### **Jigsaw Puzzle Tournament**

In partnership with the City of St. Catharines, SCPL hosted the inaugural Jigsaw Puzzle Tournament. Participating teams were challenged to complete identical 500-piece

puzzles within a two-hour time frame. The event was well-received, attracting 31 participants, and plans are underway to offer additional tournaments in the future.

There were no formal submissions received via the *Request for Program Reconsideration* form during this period.

### **Communication Highlights**

The Communications Specialist was involved in several key projects this month:

- Preparation of the Spring 2026 Program Guide
- Supporting the development of the "One READ, One STC" event
- A promotional campaign for the latest Library of Things items
- Drafting an "Emergency Website and Social Media Announcement" procedure
- Promotions for the Design a Bookmark contest, March Break programming, and Tax Clinics

February was a strong month for social media performance, marked by meaningful community connection, positive sentiment, and increased visibility for SCPL's programs and services. Customers expressed enthusiasm for library services, including the Library of Things and the children's materials. Several comments reflected how these posts encouraged **in-person visits to the library**. The library's social media presence received notable praise, with multiple users complimenting the creativity of the content, particularly around themed posts like those tied to the Super Bowl and Grammys.

## Report

### **Merritt Branch**

- A new floor mat was installed at the entrance to help protect the facility from weather-related elements.

### **Central Branch**

- In December 2025, all staff were relocated from the third floor to other areas within the Central Branch. With the assistance of a real estate professional, we issued a Request for Proposals and received submissions from several community service organizations. We have selected one of the proponents and are working toward finalizing a mutually beneficial agreement as soon as possible. Recommendation will be to allocate revenue to the Capital Reserve to offset future building costs.
- All interior doors, offices, and rental spaces have been renumbered using a standardized numbering system.
- New water shut-off valves were installed on the second and third floors.
- New slop sink faucets were installed on the second and third floors.
- A new vestibule was installed outside the HR and CEO offices to enhance privacy.
- The former program office has been converted into a new bookable meeting room and central storage area.

### **Huq Branch**

- Upper window blinds were adjusted, and a new remote control was provided.
- SCPL and City staff worked together to adjust the heating and cooling systems.

## Integrated Library System (ILS) Migration

Promotions staff met to develop a shared internal communications portal for staff, which is anticipated to launch in March. Furthermore, the Management Team met weekly with NFPL counterparts to provide project oversight and ensure the project remains on schedule.

## Quarterly Progress Update on 2026 Work Plan

### For Information

This report provides the Library Board with a strategic update on the progress of the 2026 Annual Work Plan for the first quarter.

In alignment with the revised reporting format approved in October 2025, this document moves away from documenting routine daily operations. Instead, it highlights new, innovative, and improvement-oriented initiatives that directly advance our strategic goals. This approach ensures transparent communication between staff and the Board while maintaining focus on organizational growth and transformation.

#### Background

Our **2025–2028 Strategic Plan** serves as the roadmap for evolving our services to meet the changing needs of our community. All initiatives within the 2026 Work Plan are categorized under our four core pillars:

- **Experience in Bloom:** Enhancing the user journey and physical/digital spaces.
- **Community in Bloom:** Strengthening local partnerships and social impact.
- **People in Bloom:** Investing in staff development and organizational culture.
- **Literacy in Bloom:** Promoting diverse literacies and lifelong learning.

The 2026 Work Plan includes both newly introduced projects and critical carry-forward tasks from the previous year. To ensure accountability, each initiative is assigned a lead department responsible for coordinating cross-departmental efforts and tracking milestones.

The appendix provides a snapshot of current task statuses, their specific contributions to our strategic vision, and updated timelines for completion.

#### Highlights of the first quarter in 2026

SCPL successfully launched the Community Needs Assessment project.

- Issued a formal RFP in January 2026, followed by a scoring and interview process to select the best-fit proponent.
- Nordicity has been retained to lead the project, bringing specialized expertise to our community needs assessment project.
- Held a productive kick-off meeting with the Nordicity team in early March to align on goals and timelines.
- Upcoming Milestones:

- April & May: Launch of broad community engagement, including public surveys and targeted consultation meetings.
- August: Receipt of the draft final report.
- September: Final presentation of findings and recommendations to the Board.

In partnership with the Niagara Falls Public Library (NFPL), we have officially kicked off the migration to Polaris - a new Integrated Library System (ILS).

- Spent the last several weeks in intensive collaborative sessions to define system profiles and prepare for technical setup.
- Developing a shared staff site accessible by both library systems. This hub ensures all staff members remain informed, synchronized, and supported throughout the transition.
- Upcoming Milestones:
  - April: Software installation and data mapping.
  - May, June and July: Training and testing.
  - August, September and October: Permission testing and continue internal training.
  - November: Final data extraction, offline service period, and live on Polaris.

By the end of Q1, we have successfully laid the groundwork for both our long-term strategic vision (Community Needs Assessment) and our day-to-day operational improvement (ILS Migration). Both projects remain on schedule and will be well underway by Q2.

#### **Background**

The St. Catharines Public Library offers free internet access to our customers through library-owned and maintained computers, as well as free wireless internet access for customer-owned devices. The Internet Use Policy was developed to ensure open and equitable internet access for all community members in accordance with the Library's mission statement, the Canadian Federation of Library Associations Statement on Intellectual Freedom and the Ontario Library Association's Statement on Intellectual Rights of the Individual while at the same time providing a policy to use the internet in a responsible manner.

The Policy was last amended and approved by the Board in November 2024.

## Regulations
